Overview of the Lab

Led by Principal Investigator Dr. Sean Joe, Benjamin E. Youngdahl Professor of Social Development, the Race and Opportunity Lab examines race in science, opportunity, and social mobility with an emphasis on informing policies, interventions and intra-professional practice to improve place-based capacity to reduce inequality in adolescents' healthy transition to adulthood. The lab is comprised of doctoral and master's level students. The first phase of work focuses on studies that establish baseline measures of regional capacity to ensure healthy youth development for all in the St. Louis region (St. Louis City and County).
